## SPIGNER CELEBRATES TOURNNEY MILESTONE

**BILL SPIGNER**, a United States Bowling Congress Hall of Famer and author of *BJI's* bimonthly column, "The Pro Approach," celebrated 50 years of participation in the USBC Open Championships with an August 6 party arranged by wife, Barb, and attended by friends and family. Held at Tighthead Brewing in Mundelin, Ill., 20 minutes away from Hawthorne Bowl, a center he formerly owned before selling it to Brunswick years ago, the gathering attracted ap-

proximately 80 attendees and featured a 10-minute slideshow of highlights spanning the entirety of Spigner's career. In addition to Spigner's son Robbie, included among the attendees were legend Carmen Salvino and wife Ginny, former USBC CEO Roger Dalkin and wife Karen, Luby Publishing President Keith Hamilton and wife Kathy, and the American

Bowling Congress's last President, Paul Edgers.

USBC honored Spigner for his milestone in late May, when Tournament Director Duane Hagen presented him with a plaque. "This was a lot more emotion than I thought it would be," said the 67-year-old at the time, adding that it "was still a great time because I got to be on the lanes with my friends and both of my sons."
